

One Nation Under God



I clearly remember the threat of Communism in 1954. The atomic bomb that devasted Hiroshima and Nagasaki in August of 1945 had put the whole world on edge. The tensions in that era that developed between Communist Russia and the USA caused such a great fear that many felt that the world was ready to come to its final

climax. Various civil defense strategies were put into place, and the civilians were provided information on how to protect themselves from radioactive fallout and the explosive forces of hydrogen bombs. A 15-megaton hydrogen bomb had been tested over the Pacific Ocean. It was found to be several times more powerful than predicted. In reaction to the fear of such deadly use of power, many built bomb or fallout shelters to shield their families and communities from such devastation. Fear reigned over our nation and its people.

President Eisenhower, a great General during the World War II conflict, was aware of the potential for men to build and potentially use ever more powerful weapons of destruction to combat their enemies. He had seen it firsthand, and so it was he who added two words to the United States Pledge of Allegiance that had originally been written in August of 1892 by Francis Bellamy. His two words "under God" made the Pledge read: "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all." President Eisenhower clearly understood that God was sovereign and only under Him could we be protected. It is apparent that he also understood the great responsibility that God had given this nation. In December 1953, he delivered a speech before the United Nations General Assembly entitled "Atoms for Peace." It was his every intent that mechanisms be found to change this 'fearful atomic dilemma' from a scourge to that of a 'benefit to mankind.' He wanted 'liberty and justice for all,' and only under God could this be accomplished. He was in concert with the signers of the Declaration of Independence who recognized that our Rights came from God, not governments, and so they wrote: 'We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their **Creator** with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.'

How appropriate that in today's Gospel, we should hear Jesus provide us with the first and greatest commandment: "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with thy whole heart and with thy whole soul and with thy whole mind and with thy whole strength." To do so is our greatest protection against the wiles of an enemy relentless with his intention to destroy a great nation 'under God.'

After receiving several hundred text messages, countless articles, and newscasts, we have finally decided on who we would want to be placed in charge of this great nation. Billions of dollars went into the dissemination of facts and figures to help us in the process of finally putting our 'x' next to our candidate's name. Truths have been embellished, and falsehoods have been promulgated in the months preceding

election day. Some of this has been verbalized by Cardinal Burke as 'morally disgusting.' The attempt to determine fact from fiction has been overwhelming. Hopefully, it was our prayer and supplication that finally gave us peace when we made our choices and became ready to place our ballot in the box.

Our great nation, under God, will not be saved by a man or a woman; it will be saved rather by God, who promises that: "if my people, upon whom my name has been pronounced, humble themselves and pray, and seek my presence and turn from their evil ways, I will hear them from heaven and pardon their sins and revive their land." (2 Chronicles 7:14)

As we enter yet a new era of the unknown, we can firmly know that we are protected by our God who loves us. He has given us the strongest of admonitions: "Fear is useless. What is needed is faith"! (Mark 5:36) "And lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world." (Matthew 28:20).

It will be our constant prayers, fasting, and supplication that will allow this nation to always be 'Under God'!
